State asks for help checking trees for hemlock wooly adelgid

The state Department of Natural Resources and state
Department of Agriculture and Rural Development are seeking
help with their annual hemlock wooly adelgid survey. These
invasive pests cause significant harm to our native hemlock
trees by slowly killing them. Trees can be treated to protect
from infestations if they are identified. The departments ask you
to look at your hemlock trees for round, white egg sacs on the
underside of branches; they can look like tiny cotton balls. If you
see a suspected infestation, please report, with pictures, to the
